EDUCATION AND YOUTH DEVELOPMENT

FY 2023 HIGHLIGHTS

The Education and Youth Development (EYD) program aimed to increase student enrollment and build collaborations. EYD established the G.A.R.D.E.N. project and incorporated S.T.E.A.M. project-based learning as part of their attempts to conserve the environment. The AAUL's signature Project Ready program has continued to connect over 300 children with mentors to help them achieve academically and personally. EYD is committed to educate students for a rapidly changing technological world by offering robotics, IBM Skills Build, and animation courses.

- The Urban Santa initiative was launched to give joy and cheer by providing toys and other necessities to 15 families in need for the holidays.
- High school graduates had the opportunity to attend AAUL's College and Career Fair,
 where they were able to apply to over 30 HBCUs and discuss scholarship opportunities.
- Made AAUL history by putting together an all-African American, female robotics team to compete throughout 2024.

HEALTH & WELLNESS

FY 2023 HIGHLIGHTS

With 8,045 attendees, the Health and Wellness department hosted a town hall discussion about COVID-19 and its influence on physical and mental health. The Centers for Disease Control and Prevention (CDC) also provided them with a grant for their All In campaign aimed at Health and Vaccine Equity and Protecting Diverse Communities from COVID-19. In addition, the department executed a unique initiative called Feed the 5,000, which gave food sacks and water to people living in homeless encampments.

- Successfully housed 20 people in less than 120 days using their case management services.
- Created a food drive to donate to the unhoused during the holidays.
- Partnerships with Austin Public Health, the Ending Community Homelessness Coalition, and Capital Metro will continue throughout 2024 to develop more effective and meaningful activities.

HOUSING & COMMUNITY DEVELOPMENT

FY 2023 HIGHLIGHTS

The Housing and Community Development department initiated three new projects, Minor Home Repair, Go-Repair, and Plumbing. The most impactful projects for the department in 2023 were related to plumbing and replacing exterior doors.

- Completed a 3 month project for a 92 year old client that had been securing the
 exterior front door with a screw and power drill. AAUL provided and installed a brand
 new screen door with glass and door frame..
- AAUL donated funds from its Love Thy Neighbor campaign to assure clients' safety without sacrificing quality.
- New and existing clients that owned homes received 510 emergency weather radios.

The Austin Area Urban League has done a lot for us. I brag about the Southbridge staff. They helped us, and it gave us hope. I graduated college, and I did that while I was still there. If it hadn't been for the AAUL, I would probably still be in a tent somewhere struggling. I wouldn't be where I am today. I have my own place. I have a car. I have a motorcycle. I have a college degree. I thank the Austin Area Urban League for everything and I'm grateful. They're a big part of my life and will always be."
